A Message from Fr. Andrew

Like many people, I sometimes suffer from eczema. My hands start to crack when the temperature drops and the weather becomes cold and dry. It's not the most serious condition you can have, but it is inconvenient and bothers me often. Our hands are not the most significant parts of our bodies, but a slight cut can be uncomfortable because we use our hands for everything. This is the case with every part of our body though, big or small, essential or not: when one part of our body suffers, the rest does as well. This is what our second reading today is teaching us.

St. Paul had many motives for writing his letters to the Corinthians. The prosperity and wealth of the city of Corinth contributed to a "culture war" between the Christian Corinthians and pagans who lived in contradiction to the Gospel. This also caused divisions among the Christians themselves. Paul urges the Christians of Corinth to remember who they are: THE BODY OF CHRIST! He was teaching them to thank God for the gifts He grants to the community and serve Him as faithful members of the One Body of Christ, the Church, in the same way that different parts of our bodies serve our body as a whole.

The body of Christ so united pleases our God. Our Father desires to make us one, as Jesus Christ, God the Son Incarnate, is one with Him. We are called to become one, and the more we choose to be divided, the more the Church suffers. Now, as Christians, we must remember that none of our actions and how we live is "private." Every action we take has consequences for ourselves and the whole Church.

Just like when one part of our body suffers, our whole body suffers, when one part of the Church decides to live in sin, it wounds the entire Church. One member of the body, by choosing vice over virtue and sin over holiness, begins to lose the sanctifying grace that empowers Christians to walk on the path of divinization, namely, becoming like Christ. If God had a plan for a person to become a holy priest or religious, or a lay person who would convert a thousand souls, and he or she said "no" to that call, what a terrible loss that would be not only for the Church but for the whole world. Could you imagine if Mother Theresa didn't choose to live according to the voice of God echoing in her heart? What if Pope St. John Paul II decided to be a corrupt pope instead of the heroic life he chose to live?

Likewise, each one of us has a particular purpose. The more we strive for holiness, the more we serve God and the body of His Church. So, this week, let's be attentive to God's plans for our lives. If this sounds too vague, let's start by doing small things with great love, such as praying a Hail Mary for those who have gone before us who have no one to pray for them.

Capital Campaign Update

Our Capital Campaign is winding down. Thank you to those of you who have made a gift/pledge. We are very grateful for your support of this campaign! Our goal was \$1,000,000 and as of January 21st, we have \$1,018,045 in gifts/pledges from 188 families/individuals. Of the total amount pledged, we have collected \$503,086.

This has allowed us to complete 4 projects: the replacement of the church air conditioning; painting of the religious sisters' residence; and replacement of the Nursery roof and School roof. The remainder of campaign funds will be used for: the parking lot rehabilitation; repairs to the roof of the Church; repair of plaster damage in the Church due to roof issues; the installation of new energy-efficient windows in the Nursery, sacristy and choir room; a new confessional for the Church; improvements to the women's restroom in the lower church; and a restricted reserve fund for future repair projects.

We have more than 2,000 registered families who have not yet made a pledge. We ask that you consider that this campaign should not be supported only by a very small number of people, but instead by a very large majority since it benefits everyone. This feast celebrates the occasion when Mary brought the infant Jesus to the Temple and presented him to the people. Simeon recognized Jesus as the Light of the world, saying,




"He is a light to reveal God to the nations." Therefore, the feast is also called Candlemas, meaning the Feast of Light.


