#### A Message from Fr. Brian

One of the mottos of Alcoholics Anonymous is, "Let go and let God." That often means putting God in the driver's seat. And God is a good driver. He takes us to incredible places we never would have thought to go on our own, but only when we place all our hope and trust in Him. When is the last time you said, "Lord, you lead. I'll follow?"

In our first reading this Sunday, the prophet Jeremiah tells us: "Blessed is the one who trusts in the LORD, whose hope is the LORD." We hear a lot about blessedness (that is, beatitude or happiness) in the Gospel this Sunday. Blessedness comes in large part from trusting and hoping in the Lord.

I love the story of Pope St. John XXIII. Clearly at times he would have felt the weight of the Church on his shoulders. It would have been natural for him to get anxious and to worry. But at night he would go into his private chapel to speak to Our Lord about the needs of the Church throughout the world. And he would always finish by saying, "Lord it's your Church. I've done what I can. I'm going to bed!"

We sometimes need to do the same thing, entrusting ourselves to God's Providence, His will, and His plan for us. Of course, growing in holiness and following the path God has laid before us doesn't mean that we live in a continual mystical union with God. It doesn't mean that we won't feel abandoned at times. It doesn't mean that we won't be occasionally pestered by doubts. But it does mean that at those moments when we most clearly feel God's absence, when we're paralyzed by our doubts, when anxiety is getting the better of us, we nevertheless entrust ourselves to Him, we abandon ourselves to Him, and we say, "Jesus, I trust in you."

And, again, that isn't to say that we'll experience an emotional high by just saying those words, though it does mean that we'll have united ourselves to Jesus in a very profound way. When we unite ourselves to Jesus in this way, we make an incredible act of faith, a heroic act of faith, one worthy of the great saints.

There's real power in letting go of the frustration of trying to figure everything out. When we let go of all our anxieties and doubt, when we entrust everything to Christ, in effect we are saying, "God, You are in control. Lead me and I will follow. I trust You."

Each day when we wake up, we should surrender ourselves to God, offering up our day to Him as a living sacrifice, and asking Him what His will for us is that day. When we abandon ourselves to God in this way, what we're saying to Him is this:

- Lord, even though I don't always feel it, I trust that you love me.
- Even though I can't always understand it, I trust in your mercy.
- Even though I don't always experience it, I trust in your providence.
- Even though I don't always see it, I trust in your goodness.
- Even though I don't always hear you, I trust that you are speaking to me.
- Even though I don't always sense your presence, I trust that you are with me.
- Even though I don't always see you at work in my life, I trust that you are in charge. And that is enough for me.

If we entrust ourselves to God with this mindset, we'll experience blessedness, beatitude, happiness. I guarantee it. Better yet, God guarantees it.

#### Jubilee of Hope Indulgence

During the Jubilee Year of Hope, we will have numerous opportunities to obtain a plenary indulgence, which is the remission of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt

has already been forgiven, offered by the Church through the merits of Jesus Christ. Indulgences can be applied not



only to oneself, but also the souls in Purgatory. Aside from performing one of the acts necessary to obtain the Jubilee Year of Hope indulgence, the faithful Christian must also follow these conditions:

- Have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin.
- Have sacramentally confessed their sins 20 days before or after receiving the indulgence.
- Receive the Holy Eucharist.
- Pray for the intentions of the pope.
   This can usually be done by praying one
   Our Father, one Hail Mary, and one
   Glory Be.

The following are a few of the specific acts which would allow one to obtain the Jubilee Year indulgence:

- Pilgrimages: Visit Rome, the Holy Land, the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C., or any one of the 4 designated churches in the Archdiocese of Newark:
  - Essex County: Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart, Newark
  - > Bergen County: St. Pius X, Old Tappan
  - Hudson County: St. Joseph of the Palisades, West New York
  - > Union County: St. Helen, Westfield

- The Sick and the Confined: The faithful who are truly repentant of sin but who cannot participate in the various pilgrimages and pious visits for serious reasons (especially cloistered nuns and monks, but also the elderly, the sick, prisoners, and those who, through their work in hospitals or other care facilities, provide continuous service to the sick), can obtain the Jubilee Indulgence, under the same conditions if, united in spirit with the faithful taking part in person, they recite the Our Father, the Profession of Faith in any approved form, and other prayers in conformity with the objectives of the Holy Year, in their homes or wherever they are confined offering up their sufferings or the hardships of their lives.
- Acts of Mercy: The faithful are encouraged to carry out works of charity more frequently. They should rediscover these corporal works of mercy: to feed the hungry. give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, welcome the stranger, heal the sick, visit the imprisoned, and bury the dead and rediscover the spiritual works of mercy: to counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, admonish sinners, comfort the afflicted, forgive offences. bear patiently those who do us ill, and pray for the living and the dead. In this way, the faithful will be able to obtain the Jubilee Indulgence if they visit, for an appropriate amount of time, their brothers and sisters who are in need or in difficulty (the sick, prisoners, lonely elderly people, disabled people).
- Acts of Penance: The Indulgence is also linked to certain works of penance: abstaining at least for one day of the week from futile distractions (real or virtual); abstaining from superfluous consumption (for example by fasting); donating a proportionate sum of money to the poor; supporting works in support of the protection of human life in all its phases; supporting the quality of life of abandoned children, young people in difficulty, the needy or lonely, elderly people, or migrants from various countries; dedicating a portion of time to voluntary activities that are of service to the community.




