Third Sunday of Lent

A Message from Fr. Andrew

The year 313 marked a monumental victory in the history of Christianity because of one specific event: the Edict of Milan. It granted the legal status of Christianity. Constantine's issue of the edict halted organized empire-wide persecution and, therefore, allowed the explosive growth of Christianity across Europe. Ten years later, Christianity was made the Roman Empire's official religion. People were no longer worshipping with the risk of being thrown into the lion cage for their beliefs, and Christianity started leaving its fingerprint on every aspect of the culture. The Church of the Holy Sepulcher, Old St. Peter's Basilica, and the Basilica of Saint John Lateran are three incredible crowns of Christianity's triumph when commissioned by Constantine.

Things seemed great, but this historical trend didn't appeal as something spiritually beneficial to some people. Why? For those who yearned to be so united with Christ through the crown of martyrdom, the world seemed to start taking away the chances of imitating Christ, who had first died for them because of love. So, this small group of Christians started leaving the world and their cities to reconnect themselves with the world that mattered more to them and the world they dreamed of - heaven.

That's how early monasticism began in the desert. Some people started to protest what they perceived as worldliness taking over the church after her alleged triumph in the conversion of Constantine. Instead of becoming complacent about the world that now offered a comfortable Christian life, they entered the desert's desolation. Why? To meet God there in the land where the only source of consolation is God and to live in a state of "permanent retreat."

In war, when there is a need for damage assessment and repair, the soldiers fighting on the frontlines will consider a tactical withdrawal or, in other words, a retreat. What is a retreat in our spiritual life? It is to intentionally withdraw from whatever battles we are fighting as Christians so God may nourish us more abundantly.

Just like those who withdrew from cities to deserts and soldiers who withdrew from the front line to repair and better equip themselves, we often must go somewhere for our spiritual nourishment... but not always. From Monday to Wednesday (3/24, 3/25 and 3/26) our parish is offering three days of an "in-house retreat" in the church with talks that will inspire us under the healing power of our Lord in the Eucharist. This Parish Mission will be led by the Franciscan Friars of the Renewal (CFRs as they are known). These friars are the 21st century priests and brothers who model their lives after the radical life lived by St. Francis of Assisi. They will help to reinflame the fire within us that has been dulled by the secular world and the mundanity of our daily lives.

The theme of this year's parish mission is "Renew our Hope!" Each day we will view our relationship with the Lord through a different lens of hope, enlivening our hearts and rededicating them to God. My friends, I sincerely invite you to come to be with the Lord by joining us at this triduum of hope! With talks, adoration, confessions, and a Eucharistic Healing Service, the Lord wants to embrace and heal YOU during this wonderful season of Lent. We are so thrilled to abandon ourselves once again into the loving arms of our Lord through this three-day journey. We want to see you there, sharing tears of joy with you. Also, please invite those around you who are desperately in need of hope. Let us not keep this beautiful opportunity just to ourselves, but for all those who hunger and thirst for hope in the Lord.


Coffee and Donuts and Prayers

Seven persons are preparing to enter into the fullness of the Catholic faith this Easter season.




