Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Apostles

A Message from Fr. Brian

Greetings from the rectory! I've been home from the hospital for 2 weeks now, recovering from the 2 heart attacks I suffered on June 4th. From the depth of my heart

(which is growing stronger every day \bigcirc), I want to renew my sincere and profound thanks to all of you for your many expressions of care and concern for my welfare. Your cards, emails, text messages, phone calls, and especially your prayers have helped me so much in my recovery and I am eternally grateful to you. I am awaiting direction from my doctors as to when I can resume full-time ministry. Please know, though, that even if I have been physically absent, I have been spiritually present to you, praying for your intentions every day. And please know how much I love all of you!

I also wish to thank Fr. Andrew for picking up the ball during my absence. He has done so in such a joyful and admirable way. Plus, he's gaining valuable pastoral experience in the process! I also take this opportunity to thank our wonderful parish staff for the way they have ensured that our parish has continued to thrive during my absence. Well done!

Thank you as well to the other priests who have helped with Masses and have thus allowed me to take this time to recover and heal. One of those priests, Fr. Dominic Ciriaco, has lived "in residence" at the rectory for the past year. On July 1st he will move to the seminary at Seton Hall University. Fr. Dominic has worked on the faculty at the seminary for the past year and it was decided by him, the seminary, and the Archdiocese that it would make more sense for him now to live at the place where he works. His presence will be missed in the rectory as well as in the parish, where he celebrated many Masses over the past year. We ask God's blessing upon Fr. Dominic and we thank him for his service to OLS.

Allow me to thank you for another blessing - the fact that we surpassed our Archdiocesan Annual Appeal goal! Because we did so, the parish will save about \$18,000 in assessments that we owe to the Archdiocese. Your generosity to the parish always astounds me and makes me so happy and proud to be a part of this wonderful parish community.

I humbly ask that you continue your generosity by supporting the parish throughout the summer, including while you're away on summer vacation. And please don't forget to attend Sunday Mass while you're traveling. God NEVER takes a vacation from us and we should NEVER take a vacation from Him!

Now for a word about the great Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul which we celebrate this Sunday.

Both of these amazing men, in their own way, helped to guide and make grow the early Church. They both died as martyrs in the early 60s of the 1st century. Peter was crucified upside down on Vatican Hill and Paul was beheaded outside of Rome in a place now called Tre Fontane (Italian for "three fountains" after the legend that three fountains sprang up on the three places where Paul's head bounced after he was beheaded). Peter and Paul are important for different reasons. Peter was the first Pope and kept the Church united as it grew very rapidly in the years following Pentecost. In the first years after Pentecost, it was the Jewish people who accepted Jesus as the Savior and so the early Church was a very Jewish Church. But as time went on, Paul began to preach also to non-Jewish people (the Gentiles). Through his preaching, Paul brought many non-Jewish people into the Church. So, both Peter and Paul had very significant roles in the early Church.

God called these two very different personalities to spread the Gospel. Peter's impetuous love was used to look after the flock entrusted to him. Paul's training as a Pharisee and his strength of character helped to ensure that the non-Jewish people would be welcomed into the Church. It is a reminder to us that our talents and our weaknesses too can become God's means of helping others, if we allow. We don't have to be perfect for God to work through us; God can work through us, faults and all, as he did with Peter and Paul. Through the intercession of these two great Saints, may we allow the Lord to make use of our talents (and even our weaknesses!) to help build up the kingdom of God.

And Pope Leo XIV! For the first time in our Church AND Nation's history, we have an American Pope! What an exciting time to be an American Catholic!

Did you know?... that St. Elizabeth Ann Seton is the first American-born Saint? Here are some fun facts about this holy American:

- 1. Elizabeth was a Catholic convert. Born to an Episcopalian family in New York City, she became a Catholic after the death of her husband.
- 2. Her family strongly disapproved of her decision and rejected her and her five children. Disowned and impoverished, she moved to Emmitsburg in Marvland. the first state to offer a haven for Catholics who were widely persecuted at the time.
- 3. It was in Emmitsburg that she began the Sisters of Charity religious order, which adopted the rule of the Daughters of Charity founded by St. Vincent de Paul and St. Louise de Marillac
- 4. Mother Seton established the first Catholic school for girls in Baltimore; she is considered the pioneer of Catholic education in the United States
- 5. Our very own Seton Hall University was founded in 1856 by her nephew, Bishop James Roosevelt Bayley who named the University after his aunt as "a home for the mind, the heart, and the spirit."
