Feast of the Holy Family

A Message from Fr. Andrew

"I, N., take you, N., to be my wife/husband. I promise to be faithful to you, in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, to love you and to honor you all the days of my life."

The statement above comes from one of the formulas of declaration of consent at the sacrament of matrimony. I often witness couples tearing up as they open their lips to declare their consent. When you try to meditate and chew on the words above, it is not too hard to understand why it brings couples to tears. One man and a woman, two individuals with unique wounds, choose to enter each other's wounds and make them their own. Their declaration of love and faithfulness, without condition, mirrors the love of Christ for humanity and His Church. This sacrament, a beautiful participation in the mission and mystery of Christlike love, is not a mere contract but a sacred covenant.

Today, as we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family, I couldn't help but bring all of us to these profound words of consent. Why? Because the Sacrament of Matrimony is the first chapter of the family's life and the Christian home. Christian family built on the foundation of the sacrament of matrimony is "the domestic church, a community of grace and prayer, a school of human virtues and Christian charity" (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1666).

The Holy Family of Nazareth is the ideal model of every Christian family. The tiny house in Nazareth was filled with Christlike love. Joseph and Mary loved each other precisely how the words of consent describe what love towards a spouse must look like. Jesus, our God, advanced in wisdom, age, and favor before God and man in His humanity, witnessing the love shared between Mary, His Mother, and Joseph, His foster father. Jesus' life on earth was not just about His public ministry. In His hidden life as the God-Man, He bridged the gap between Himself and humanity, sanctifying and elevating the dignity of human life. His family life with Joseph and Mary was a means to sanctify the dignity of family life.

With our God living in a human family, our family life is no longer just a biological connection but a sanctified reality, a temple where God's spirit dwells. We conclude this year with this special feast that celebrates not only the Holy Family of Nazareth but also the sanctity of every one of our families. Many of us will join our families to celebrate the new year and to bid farewell to the past year. We believe in God, who knows no coincidence and makes no mistakes. This unique bookend to the year should tell us something. So, the question is, how well do we do to live out our call to make family life the domestic church? If you are married, are you truly living up to the words of consent and letting that love be a light to this world, reflecting Christ's love for humanity?

Our New Year's resolutions are often vague and distant from our daily lives. I invite all of us to start with our families. If we desire to be more loving, why not begin with our family members? Just as Christ first lived as a Good Son before becoming a Good Shepherd, we too must first live out unconditional love within our families – in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health. Once that is done, we can let that love radiate worldwide.

Hope Springs in the Eternal City!



Signs around the Eternal City declare "Roma si trasforma" – "Rome is transformed" as an explanation for the ubiquitous infrastructure projects

underway, including the restoration of iconic sculptures and monuments, ahead of Jubilee 2025, a Holy Year that begins Christmas Eve.

A jubilee year, also known as a "holy year," is a special year in the life of the Church currently celebrated every 25 years. The theme of the Holy Year is "Pilgrims of Hope." The papal bull, issued May 9, that introduced the coming Jubilee Year is titled "Spes Non Confundit," or "Hope does not disappoint," drawn from Romans 5:5.

"Everyone knows what it is to hope," Pope Francis wrote. "In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring. For all of us, may the Jubilee be an opportunity to be renewed in hope. God's word helps us find reasons for that hope." — Adapted from Catholic Standard www.cathstan.org

January 1st Holy Day of Obligation



A reminder that New Year's Day is the Solemnity of Mary, Holy Mother of God and a holy day of obligation. We will have two Masses at 10:00am and 11:30am.

The actual title of this feast is "the Octave Day of Christmas and the Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God."

Within this feast is multiple layers, but the title itself indicates it is a feast of our Lord, repeating the solemnity of Christmas, but also honors Mary as the Mother of God. The Mass readings return to the stable at Bethlehem, picking up right after the Gospel from Midnight Mass of Christmas...While Christmas is considered primarily a feast of our Lord on the liturgical calendar, "the Church both adores the Saviour and venerates his glorious Mother." So January 1st, the Octave Day of Christmas, IS repeating again this feast of Christmas, honoring both Jesus and Mary.— Taken from www.catholicculture.org
