January 5, 2020 The Epiphany of Our Lord

Stewardship is sharing our time, talent & treasure

A Message From Fr. Brian

This weekend we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany of Our Lord. The word *Epiphany* is a funny, strange word and that's because it's Greek. It means a manifestation or appearance of any sort. And there is no greater epiphany than when God reveals Himself in the Person of His Son, Jesus Christ. He does it on this Feast through the visit of the magi, the 3 Wise Men. Tradition gives their names as Melchior, Balthazar and Gaspar. While most of Israel was ignorant of the Messiah's birth, these pagan astrologers from a foreign land discovered Him and paid Him homage.

Now I invite you to think about how those Wise Men felt when they finally reached Bethlehem and found Jesus. What were their emotions, their sentiments? Aside from feelings of awe and adoration and gratitude and homage that they would have had kneeling before the world's King, would they not also have been – surprised? In fact, would those Wise Men not have been shocked to find the King they were seeking...hidden away in a stable?

Really, a baby? Not a king in a palace, but a baby in a stable. Surrounded not by royal guards, but by lowly shepherds. Warmed not by cozy, satin clothes, but by the breath of oxen and sheep. Seated not on a throne, but cuddled in the arms of His mother. Were they not surprised?

You better believe they were surprised. This is not what they expected. And this is one of the lessons of this great Feast of the Epiphany: The Divine is usually found where we least expect it. We normally look for the Divine in the dramatic, the miraculous, the extraordinary, the earth-shaking. But the Divine, more often than not, is found in the quiet, the simple, the ordinary, the day-in and day-out things of life. Divinity is usually found where we least expect it.

We find the Divine in the kindness of strangers, in the beauty of God's creation, in the forgiveness offered to us by those we have offended, in the love between a parent and child, in beautiful music, and in a million other ways and places. These are just a few of the simple, ordinary, everyday ways in which God sneaks into our lives, and like those 3 magi, we should be filled with awe and adoration, with reverence and homage.

The Wise Men brought Our Savior gifts: gold for a king, frankincense for a priest, and myrrh for a victim. They showed us what to do when we finally recognize the Divine: We are to come before Him and open up our treasure chests. But Our Lord doesn't want or expect gold, frankincense, and myrrh from us. He wants a heart filled with love, love of Him, love of each other, and love of every situation in which God manifests Himself in this world.

In speaking of the 3 Wise Men, there's an old expression: "The wise still seek Him." In this New Year, the challenge for us is to seek to find God in our everyday lives. Here's my challenge for us: Today, search for a spark of the Divine in someone, in something, or in some situation. Do that today. And then do it again tomorrow. And then again the next day. And the day after that. And the day after that. You get the idea.

If we do that, we'll see that God is manifesting Himself to us continually and it will be like celebrating Christmas all over again, only without all of the fuss and details, but instead with love and adoration and thanksgiving.

528 Incarnation The magi's coming to Jerusalem in order to pay homage to the king of the Jews shows that they seek in Israel, in the messianic light of the star of David, the one who will be king of the nations. Their coming means that pagans can discover Jesus and worship him as Son of God and Savior of the world only by turning toward the Jews and receiving from them the messianic promise as contained in the Old Testament. The Epiphany shows that "the full number of the nations" now takes its "place in the family of patriarchs," and acquires Israelitica dignitas (are made "worthy of the heritage of israel.")
