A Message from Fr. Brian

There are approximately 44 million people in the world who are blind. Another 295 million suffer from moderate to severe vision impairment. Imagine not being able to visually see your loved ones? Or not being able to see the beautiful world that surrounds us?

That was the situation faced by Bartimaeus, the man who is healed of his blindness by Jesus in this Sunday's Gospel. Of course, there is another type of blindness that we often suffer from: spiritual blindness. This type of blindness prevents us from seeing the world as it is, that prevents us from seeing what really matters, that keeps us from seeing what Christ sees.

Bartimaeus knew that he was blind and that he needed Our Lord's healing power to make him see. He knew it and he acted upon it. The question for us is: Do we know that we too are often blind? Do we know that we really don't see reality as Jesus sees it, that we often don't even see the presence of God in our lives, that we're bedazzled and blinded by the glitz and glitter of this world, and that our souls are often surrounded by a spiritual darkness? Do we see this?

Bartimaeus was insistent on encountering Jesus so that Our Lord might heal him. In his darkness and in faith, he said to Jesus, "Master, I want to see." And what did Jesus do? He stopped everything to pay personal attention to him. St. Mark records this as the last miracle that Jesus worked before entering into Jerusalem to suffer and die. Jesus brings His whole redemptive journey to a grinding halt to respond to this blind man's request.

And what was Bartimaeus' reaction to Our Lord curing him? The Gospel says, "He followed Him on the way." He followed in Jesus' footsteps. He wanted to see and experience life as Jesus did.

This is a wonderful Gospel passage for helping us reflect on what we see. Or perhaps even more importantly, what we don't see. What do we fail to see because of our apathy, indifference, selfishness, pride, or arrogance? Do we see the hurting, the hungry, the miserably poor, the suffering and the outcast?

The media presents us with all the glittering beautiful people, those at the pinnacle of political and corporate power, the superstars in the sports and entertainment worlds. But what about the little people, the no-names that never interest the TV and newspaper reporters unless they are struck by tragedy?

Christ asks us to see and pay attention to those who are marginalized, those whom this world holds in little regard, those whom this world judges to be of little value. That means the unborn, the elderly, the poor, the sick, the lonely, the depressed, and everyone else that the world considers to be the refuse of humanity.

Helen Keller said that there are none so blind as those who refuse to see. In that sense, spiritual blindness is much more insidious than physical blindness. We therefore beg Our Lord to heal our blindness, to restore our sight so that we can see the world as He sees it. Like Bartimaeus, we ask Jesus to heal us, crying out to Him, "Master, I want to see." And like Bartimaeus, we should commit ourselves to ignoring what the world thinks should be seen and honored. And like Bartimaeus, we follow Jesus Christ. That's what Christians do. They see as Christ sees and then they follow Him.

Jesus, we want to see. Have pity on us.


Prayer for Vocations
