

A Message from Fr. Brian

God gave Moses only 10 Commandments. The Jewish Rabbis then added 613 commands, rules, precepts, and prohibitions, including everything from the correct way to trim your beard to the number of steps you could walk without violating the Sabbath.

In this Sunday's Gospel, one of the Scribes asked Jesus which is the most important command. But Jesus doesn't give just one. He gives two. He repeats what Moses said in our 1st reading this Sunday: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Both of these commandments had always been part of the Jewish religion. The way Jesus responded, though, is unique. He yoked these two commands together, letting us know that we can't love the God we do not see, if we don't love the neighbor we do see.

So, love God and love your neighbor. That is Christianity at its bare bones essentials. The entirety of God's revelation, all of it, everything, is pared away and reduced by Christ to these two commandments of loving God and loving our neighbor.

But, again, even these two commandments are really just one – because they are so intimately connected, so closely united, that they are but two aspects of the one same reality. One can't exist without the other. We can't pretend that we can love God and at the same time not love each other. It's a logical impossibility to think that love of God and love of neighbor can somehow be separated.

We are all made in God's image and likeness. And so when we love our neighbor, we are loving people who themselves are unique reflections of the image of God. People used to ask St. Mother Theresa of Calcutta why she cared for those dying in the gutters of Calcutta, India. Her response was, "How can you love God and not care for His image?" God expects us to reverence His image and presence in each other.

Now, I admit, it's not always easy to love our neighbor, especially when those around us aren't always so lovable (or even likeable!). Nevertheless, it's in loving our neighbor that we truly demonstrate our love for God. That means being determined to act rightly and justly and charitably and patiently and kindly with all people, especially those that we live and work with. And it means loving even the disagreeable people, the unattractive, the unintelligent, and the least likable.

No doubt, it's hard to have affection for people who lie, cheat, steal, gossip, dress funny, and root for the Boston Red Sox. But whether we find it easy or not, the most immediate way to love God is to love one another. When we do this, we make tangible and concrete our love of God.

Jesus did not come to complicate our lives. In fact, He simplifies it, if we would just follow His two basic commandments of loving God and loving our neighbor. The pagan world used to say of Christians: *"See how they love each other."* Let's make sure that the world says the same of us.
