

November 5, 2023 Thirty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time

A Message from Fr. Brian

I can only imagine how many prayers have been recently said worldwide asking God to bring some peace to the Middle East. As we watch the enormous human suffering that is being experienced there, it absolutely breaks our hearts. And when we think about the needless suffering in places like Ukraine, as well as in many parts of Africa that are being devastated by war and violence, we can easily become overwhelmed by the lack of peace in the world.

From my own pastoral ministry, I know that aside from there being a lack of world peace, our own individual lives can often be inflicted by a lack of <u>interior peace</u>. That doesn't need to be the case. We are all capable of experiencing true, authentic interior peace. The response for the Psalm this Sunday is, *"In You, Lord, I have found my peace."*

The key to interior peace and joy is found in being in a loving relationship with God. Yet, we so often allow ourselves to be robbed of that interior peace. What are some of the thieves of interior peace and joy? Allow me to name just a few:

1) *Self-pity.* We've probably all experienced this. We start to feel bad for ourselves, to begin counting not our blessings, but instead our misfortunes. We start to feel as though we're taken for granted and unappreciated. The center of my thoughts and energy becomes "me," instead of Jesus and His people. That's self-pity and it robs us of peace.

2) *Worrying.* Of all the living creatures that God made, we human beings are the only ones that worry. And we worry about everything. You name it, somebody, somewhere is worrying about it. Of course, we all know deep down that worrying produces nothing but ulcers. The antidote to worrying is abandoning ourselves to God, burying all our worries in His loving will. One of the mottos of Alcoholics Anonymous is, "Let go and let God." That's good advice and it reduces useless worrying and anxiety in our lives and it brings us interior peace.

3) *Complaining.* We've all met people who would have even complained about the menu at the Last Supper! Their glasses are always half-empty, they're more prone to criticize than compliment, and they discourage rather than encourage. The opposite of complaining is gratitude. We are called to be a people of gratitude, grateful for all the good things God has given us and also for all the challenges that God has placed before us to make us stronger and more like Him.

4) *Sin.* This is the most significant thing that deprives us of living a peace-filled life. When we are mired in sin, we turn away from God, and that is a sure way of robbing ourselves of interior peace. But there's a very simple solution: confession, which turns us back to God. Even the formula of absolution which the priest says to the penitent makes reference to this. It goes, in part, *"…through the ministry of the church may God grant you pardon and peace…"*

So, those are a few of the things that rob us of interior peace and joy. Are there tremendous problems in the world? Of course, there are. And we're called to do everything we can to alleviate the suffering of those around us, to mourn with those whose lives have been shattered by tragedy or sorrow. But at the same time, we have reason to rejoice because God has come into this world, and He has set in motion the events that will bring an end to all these things. Death and war and disease and sorrow and suffering will not have the final word. God has already spoken the final Word. The final Word is Jesus Christ and it is in Him that we find interior peace.



Update from the OLS Food Pantry

The OLS Food Pantry is very busy and demand for our services remain high. We are serving nearly 200-250 families with each pantry distribution. For the calendar year 2022, this amounts to 8,341 bags of groceries provided to 6,773 families made up of 25,066 individuals. In addition to the staple items, each family receives fresh produce and milk with each distribution. This would not be possible without the generosity of Our Lady of Sorrows church, its parishioners and the surrounding community. Thank you.

Please continue to help us keep our shelves stocked with basic grocery items including hot/cold cereal (low sugar), pasta and sauce, peanut butter and jelly, beans (can/dry), canned tuna/chicken and rice. Food donations can be dropped off in the lower church Monday-Friday, 9:30am-4:00 pm inside the 4th Street entrance (buzz to be let in) or in the church vestibule Saturday/Sunday morning.
