February 26, 2023 1st Sunday of Lent

A Message from Fr. Brian

Did you hear about the guy who went on a diet? He took his new diet seriously, even changing the route that he drove to work so as to avoid his favorite bakery. And he was doing great until one day he accidently drove his old route which took him by the bakery and as he approached he began to get a whiff of the wonderful smells coming from the bakery. He knew he was in trouble. He knew this would be a tough temptation to resist and so he said a quick prayer. He said, "Lord, help me to resist this temptation, but if you really want me to stop at the bakery to get my favorite pastry, well then, let me know by opening up a parking spot right in front of the bakery." And sure enough, the 5th time around the block, he found that spot.

We all face temptations, right? We hear in this Sunday's first reading how the serpent tempted Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. Even Our Blessed Lord faced temptations. As we hear in this Sunday's Gospel, at the very beginning of His public ministry, Jesus confronted – face to face – the evil of the world. He retreated into the desert and remained there for 40 days, tempted by Satan. We know, of course that Jesus left that desert victorious over Satan.

With Lent just a few days old now, it's a good time to remind ourselves that Satan really does exist and that he is actively trying to tempt us, especially during this holy season of Lent when we're trying to grow in holiness. Satan, of course, would love nothing more than to disrupt our attempt to grow in holiness.

That's the bad news. The good news is that with the victory of Jesus Christ, the devil's dominion has been shattered. Because of Our Lord's redeeming work on the Cross, the devil can only cause real harm to those who freely allow him to do so, to those who consent to evil, to those who freely give-in to temptation.

There's no point denying that we struggle against temptation. But we need to know that we're not powerless. It's within our power to resist Satan and his enticements. We don't need to inject ourselves into his devious world. We don't need to fall for his tricks.

And Our Lord has left us many weapons to fight against temptation, including those that the Church suggests for us during Lent: prayer, fasting and almsgiving. My friends, we're engaged in spiritual warfare. If we think we can fight the battle by ourselves, we're just fooling ourselves. The enemy is much more clever than we are. But with God, we become much more powerful than the enemy. And God has given us the weapons, especially during this Lenten season, to take on the enemy. If we don't make use of them, we might as well just hoist up the white flag of surrender.

So, one of our goals this Lent should be to examine the temptations that we face every day and the way we react to them. How much of a fight do we put up against temptation? Are we smart enough to make use of the weapons that God has given us to fight against temptation?

Lent is a time for conversion. Let's not allow this Lent to pass by without stimulating in our souls a deep desire to overcome our temptations. Anyone who has been on a diet will tell you the same thing: that extra pastry is tempting and might taste awfully good, but you'll pay the price later.


<u>Congratulations to our second 2023 Calendar</u> <u>Raffle Winner!</u>



2023 Lenten Regulations

1. The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily His Resurrection. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.

> On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted, and two (2) smaller meals which, if added together, would not exceed the main meal in quantity. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

> On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

2. The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence "substantially," or as a whole, is a serious obligation.

3. The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.

4. The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the **First Sunday of** Lent, <u>February 26, 2023</u> to the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, <u>June 4, 2023</u>.


