

A Message from Fr. Brian

Our Christian faith encourages us to be a people of hope, even when it seems that God is absent or asleep. Many people may feel like God is asleep right now. I don't know a time in my own life more than the times we're currently living through that so many people on planet earth are in need of the virtue of hope. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* defines hope as, "The theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit."

It's true that we have all sorts of natural hopes: we hope that we'll win the lottery. Students hope that they will get good grades. I hope that my Cleveland Browns will make it to the playoffs this year! (some would say it's also a pipedream!).

Those are all natural hopes. But supernatural hope is that virtue by which we trust that God keeps His promises come what may. And St. Peter reminds us in our 2nd reading that we must "Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope."

The reason for our hope is a Person – the Person of Jesus Christ, who has reconciled us to Himself and loves us in ways that we can't even begin to fathom. Hope is the realization that, no matter what, God loves us and desires nothing more than our holiness.

Supernatural hope allows us to believe that God is faithful to His promises – not assuring us comfort, ease, perfection and smooth sailing, but instead assuring us of His love, care, mercy, and eternal life.

During these difficult days that we're living through, we need to persevere in hope more than ever, knowing that no matter what comes our way, if we have Jesus in our lives – and we do – somehow, someway, in the end we'll be OK.

Not to get ahead of ourselves, (and certainly not to make you think of one more challenge!), but later in the summer, the hurricane season will arrive. Perhaps you've heard the spiritual life compared to a hurricane. In the midst of the turbulence and destructive force of the storm, there's the "eye of the hurricane," an island of peace, calm, and serenity.

So it is with our spiritual life. In the midst of the storms and setbacks and crisis and the just plain daily grind that can overwhelm us, we harbor an inner space of peace, calm and serenity. That's where Jesus dwells. Hope tells us that He isn't asleep, that He'll bring calm to the storms of our life.

This is the way St. Alphonsus Ligouri put it: "The more a person loves God, the more reason he has to hope in Him. This hope produces in the Saints an unutterable peace, which they preserve in even in adversity, because as they love God, and know how beautiful He is to those who love Him, they place all their confidence and find all their repose in Him alone."

The world, the Church, and each one of us is in need of a good dose of hope. My hope, and I'm certain that it is yours too, is that soon we all gather together in Church as the family of God for the celebration of Holy Mass. I'm hoping for that even more than I'm hoping for a Browns Super Bowl!

Suggestions for staying close spiritually while maintaining a safe and respectful social distance:

- 1) Begin each day with prayer. Ask Jesus to stay close to you and to all your family and friends. Pray for the health and well being of everyone you associate with, and of all God's people throughout the world.
- 2) Express your love and concern for the people you live with your spouse, children, other relatives or friends. Comfort and encourage them when they are frightened and feeling closed in or helpless.
- 3) Reach out to other family members, friends and colleagues by telephone, texting, email and other forms of social media. Let them know that you are close to them and that you share their experiences and anxiety.
- 4) Attend Mass and other prayers and devotions virtually. Many opportunities are available each day on television, radio and online. Participation in the life of the Church can help us feel more closely connected with God and with each other. Make the following spiritual Communion: Dear Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Most Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist. I love you above all things, and desire to receive your Body and Blood. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. Stay close to me, Jesus, so that I may be close to all our sisters and brothers. especially those who are most in need of your loving care. Amen.
- 5) As you go about your daily business working remotely, studying at home, doing spring cleaning, caring for children or family members, preparing dinner, doing laundry, and more look for opportunities to offer up your activities to God in gratitude for His closeness to you.

The Archdiocese of Newark has informed us of the planned reopening of our churches in 3 phases:

Phase 1: Beginning this Sunday, May 17, churches may open for *private* prayer (not Mass or public devotions) and for the Sacrament of Reconciliation (confession). Please note the following:

- Our parish church will be open from 12:00
 Noon 3:00 pm every day of the week,
 beginning this Sunday.
- Confessions will be heard this Sunday, May 17th, from 12:00 3:00 pm and on every Saturday thereafter, from 1:00 2:00 pm, beginning May 23rd.
- Individuals and families must maintain social distancing (6 feet) between each person while in the church.
- Nobody will be admitted into the church without a mask.
- Those who show symptoms of COVID-19 or who have been exposed to an infected person are not permitted to enter the church for 14 days.

Phase 2 (date TBD): We will be permitted to celebrate public *weekday* Masses and funerals with very specific restrictions, such as the strict practice of social distancing, use of masks, and a limited number of people present.

Phase 3 (date TBD): We will be permitted to celebrate Sunday Mass publicly with the obligatory practice of social distancing, use of masks, and a limited number of people present. Baptisms and weddings will be permitted according to forthcoming directives.

Cardinal Tobin continues to dispense the faithful from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays. We will continue to live stream our Sunday Mass at 10:00 am during Phases 1, 2 and 3. Once Phase 2 begins, we will discontinue the live streaming of our weekday Mass, but we will continue to live stream our Sunday Mass at 10:00 am.

As soon as we receive the dates for Phases 2 and 3, as well as the directives that must be followed during those phases, we will let you know.

For now, let us thank God that our churches are reopened for private prayer and that the people of God may receive God's mercy and forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

The Archdiocese of Newark has partnered with GoFundMe Charity to help parishes during this time when parish finances are being so negatively affected. This is a coordinated and unified effort by the Archdiocese and all parishes within the Archdiocese.

Thankfully, Cardinal Tobin has temporarily waived the usual archdiocesan assessment in support of donations given through this GoFundMe. The assessment is an administrative fee charged to parishes to support archdiocesan operations and ministries. We will not have to pay that 18% fee for contributions made through GoFundMe, which charges only a small fee per donation to cover payment processing, as is typical for online fundraising platforms. Aside from that small fee, every penny that you give will go directly to OLS.

Please note, though, that contributions through those 2 means will continue to be assessed by the Archdiocese, while contributions to the GoFundMe Charity will not be assessed.
