

The Ascension of the Lord

A Message from Stephanie Sonnick, Ministerial Associate

Friends,

I am grateful to Father Brian for asking me to pen this bulletin column. My journey into lay ministry as a profession has included many "aha, why didn't I know that?!" moments, and one of those moments involves the feast that we celebrate today: the Ascension of Jesus into heaven. Below I'll share with you why we celebrate it and mention two opportunities that the parish is offering in light of it.

How does the Ascension "fit in" to the story of salvation? As my colleague Jen Noll explains each week to our CCD children, mankind's relationship with God was broken through the sin of our first parents. After thousands of years preparing our hearts (the Old Testament is long!), God revealed himself fully to us in Jesus, true God and true man, who died and conquered death so "that the world might be saved through him" (John 3:16).

So, if we are saved through Jesus, why didn't Jesus stick around on Earth after His Resurrection, traveling, preaching, and healing people until the end of time? My friends, Jesus ascends to heaven because the story of God saving us doesn't end with Jesus' life (or our life) being restored on Earth. Jesus' life must also be restored in Heaven so that He can intercede for us. From Heaven, the glorified Jesus and God the Father send the gift of their very own divine life into the hearts of God's followers on Earth. This divine life is called the Holy Spirit.

Yes, it's true: Jesus died and rose again not just to "wipe the slate clean," but to give you and me the gift of His own divine life in our own hearts through the sacraments, and in the Church to be an extension of His body on earth. By this gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church, *you and I can still be touched by His hands and nourished by His words and Body* at the Eucharist, because it is God's very divine life at work. We see this in today's first reading from the Book of Acts: Jesus proclaims to His followers that they will soon "receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses...to the ends of the earth." It is only in receiving this gift of the Spirit – God's very life – that Jesus' followers can bring His salvation to the ends of the earth.

The reality of the Holy Spirit is a joy-filled truth that many of us (myself included) did not grow up understanding! Luckily, OLS is offering a few opportunities this summer to take a step in that direction. First, I sincerely invite you to join our **Lectio Divina Prayer Workshop**, taking place on Saturday June 3rd from 9-11:15 am. Join us to learn and practice this 4-step approach to prayer that attunes you to the Spirit's presence in Scripture. (RSVP to <u>olschurchministries@gmail.com</u>. Breakfast is included!) For those feeling a deeper call, the parish is offering an 8-week guided small group "retreat in daily life" based on the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius. This experience, called 8 Weeks in Manresa: Spiritual Exercises for our Times, involves daily personal prayer and a weekly discussion group. These Spiritual Exercises have helped millions of people develop a closer relationship with God in their lives; are you being called to do that this summer? <u>Self-Intinction of the Precious Blood is not</u> permitted

As previously noted, the Archdiocese of Newark once again permits the distribution of the Precious Blood (it had not been permitted during the pandemic).

Please also know that self-intinction of the Host into the Precious Blood is not permitted. That is to say, the person receiving the Host is not permitted to dip the Host into the Precious Blood on his or her own. Intinction is only permitted when the priest dips the Host into the Precious Blood and then the person receiving must receive the intincted Host on the tongue.

Following is the Church's teaching: "Holy Communion may be distributed by intinction in the following manner: Each communicant, while holding a Communion-plate under the mouth, approaches the priest who holds a vessel with the sacred particles, with a minister standing at his side holding the chalice. The Priest takes a Host, intincts it partly in the chalice an, showing it, says, 'The Body and Blood of Christ.' The communicant replies, 'Amen,' receives the Sacrament in the mouth from the priest, and then withdraws. The communicant, including the extraordinary minister, is never allowed to self-communicate, even by means of intinction."

Due to the complexity of administering Communion by intinction, it is rarely an option to do so in a parish setting, including at OLS. We will therefore not be distributing Communion by intinction at OLS and we request that you do not bring the Host to a Communion minister and ask the minister to dip the Host into the cup or to dip the Host into the cup (self-intinct) yourself.

Please also know that because the Host alone contains the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus, you should not feel compelled to receive the Precious Blood out of a sense that you are somehow receiving "more of Jesus" when you do so.


