Stewardship is sharing our time, talent & treasure

A Message from Fr. Brian

As you well know, you have not been able to attend Sunday Mass since the weekend of March 14th. For three months, you've been unable to worship with your parish family in church, you've been unable to be present in church to hear the Scriptures proclaimed at Mass, and worst of all, you've been unable to receive Jesus in the Eucharist. I know how difficult this has been for you and I pray that we never have to go through anything like this again.

I'm hopeful and confident that we will soon be able to come together for Mass. Gov. Murphy just today (Tuesday) announced that he is finally loosening the restrictions he had placed on houses of worship. I share with so many others the frustration of having had to deal with the consequences of the double standard that churches have had to endure during the COVID-19 pandemic. I know that it's been written a million times already, but allow me to add my voice: It's difficult to understand why big box stores and liquor stores were allowed to remain open, but churches weren't. It's difficult to understand why we could have protests with thousands of people standing shoulder to shoulder, but couldn't have Mass even when we were ready to practice social distancing and all of the other precautions. I get it: we need to protect the health of everyone and we can't be cavalier about that. I'm fully on board with that. But, in my mind, enough is enough. In fact, it was too much.

Our churches are and have been willing to do whatever is necessary to protect your health. We've taken greater precautions than the supermarkets and liquor stores and gardening centers and the other so-called "essential" businesses that have remained open throughout this lockdown. Our parish church, I guarantee you, is safer than any supermarket, where hundreds of people freely wander about.

None of this is to suggest that those who are more prone to illness (the elderly and immune deficient) should not continue to practice health safety by remaining at home for the time being. But for those whose good health condition gives them confidence to come to church for Mass, nothing at this point should hold you back once we are given the full green light.

I've communicated with so many of you who tell me of your great desire to receive the Eucharist again and what an incredible sacrifice it's been over the last 3 months to not be able to do so, even though you have been able to enter into and shop at any number of stores (the double standard has been truly mind boggling). You have told me that while you're appreciative of our live stream Masses, it's not the same as being able to receive the very Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament. I'll be honest with you, I've had a tinge of guilt every time I've received Holy Communion, knowing that the vast majority of you have not had that possibility. My heart truly aches for you.

As we celebrate the Solemnity of Corpus Christi this weekend, it's a cruel irony that you cannot come to Mass to receive Him whom we honor on this Feast. My prayer for you, though, is that you will soon be able to be fed and nourished by the Body and Blood of Jesus at Holy Mass. And my prayer for you is that in the future you will maintain the great hunger for the Eucharist that you have now.

I ask that you please keep in your prayers all of our young people who were scheduled to receive their First Holy Communion this Spring. Their wait will be even longer than yours, as they will not celebrate their First Communions until September. Our prayer for them is that while they continue their wait, their hunger and thirst for Jesus in the Eucharist will grow ever stronger.

We have all heard the old adage: absence makes the heart grow stronger. May that be true for each of you as you continue your wait. And as you prepare to receive Jesus in your next Communion, perhaps it would be fruitful to meditate on the words of St. Josemaría Escrivá: "When you approach the tabernacle, remember that He has been waiting for you for 20 centuries."

REPORTING ABUSE: AN UPDATE

Since 2002, the Archdiocese of Newark has formalized a process of reporting sexual abuse allegations, in accordance with the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, Essential Norms and a Memorandum of Understanding between the state prosecutors' offices and the NJ Dioceses. A year ago, Pope Francis issued an apostolic letter, Vos estis lux mundi, (You are the light of the world) that strengthened and formalized the process for holding bishops accountable. As part of the implementation of the letter here in the United States, a platform was created by an independent, third party providing a secure, confidential, and professional way to report allegations against living bishops. This service is in place to gather and relay reports of sexual misconduct involving bishops of the United States, and reports of their intentional interference in a sexual abuse investigation. Individuals may make a report online at www.ReportBishopAbuse.org or by calling toll free (800) 276-1562.

If you wish to report any other kind of misconduct by a bishop—or sexual abuse by a priest, deacon, religious brother or sister, or layperson working for the Church—please contact the Archdiocese of Newark at (201) 407-3256.

From the Blood Drive Committee:

Though coronavirus may be preventing us from conducting our scheduled June 2020 blood drive, please don't let it prevent you from considering the needs of others. Blood product reserves are always depleted during the summer months and the current pandemic has only compounded the problem. Yet, consider the cancer patient who isn't afforded the luxury of taking time off from chemotherapy during this lockdown; they are among many who so desperately rely on your selfless donations.

May we encourage you to reach out to Vitalant blood services to **schedule** a donation. They have fixed donation sites in West Orange, Parsippany, Lincoln Park and Paramus, and can be contacted via vitalant.org or by phoning 201–251–3703.

All donors and staff will have their temperatures taken before being allowed to enter the blood drawing site

Suggestions for staying close spiritually while maintaining a safe and respectful social distance:

- 1) Begin each day with prayer. Ask Jesus to stay close to you and to all your family and friends. Pray for the health and well being of everyone you associate with, and of all God's people throughout the world.
- 2) Express your love and concern for the people you live with your spouse, children, other relatives or friends. Comfort and encourage them when they are frightened and feeling closed in or helpless.
- 3) Reach out to other family members, friends and colleagues by telephone, texting, email and other forms of social media. Let them know that you are close to them and that you share their experiences and anxiety.
- 4) Attend Mass and other prayers and devotions virtually. Many opportunities are available each day on television, radio and online. Participation in the life of the Church can help us feel more closely connected with God and with each other. Make the following spiritual Communion: Dear Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Most Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist. I love you above all things, and desire to receive your Body and Blood. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. Stay close to me, Jesus, so that I may be close to all our sisters and brothers, especially those who are most in need of your loving care. Amen.
- 5) As you go about your daily business working remotely, studying at home, doing spring cleaning, caring for children or family members, preparing dinner, doing laundry, and more look for opportunities to offer up your activities to God in gratitude for His closeness to you.
