

September 17, 2023 Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

A Message from Fr. Andrew

Friday the 15th was the Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows, the patronal feast of our parish. So, I want to invite all of us to meditate on the love of our Mother, who loves us so much to the extent of embracing all the sufferings she was called to embrace. She did it for every one of you, and me.

The Scripture tells us that the Blessed Mother suffered no birth pangs as She was giving birth to our Lord. She was conceived without any stain of original sin; therefore, she did not suffer one of the physical consequences of original sin recorded in Genesis: birth pangs. However, she experienced birth pangs in a very special way throughout Her life, while helping her Son give birth to the Church, especially at the moment of the Crucifixion. All the sufferings she embraced with faith as the Mother of God and the Church were indeed birth pangs and so painful.

The ancient tradition says St. Joseph died during Jesus' teenage years before His public ministry. Losing a wonderful husband who was so holy, humble, and prayerful must have been one of the saddest days in Her life, as it meant losing Her beloved companion and the best friend in Her journey. No one else had understood the cross of Her life as the mother of God as much as Christ and St. Joseph did.

Having no room to give birth to her son, fleeing to Egypt to avoid bloodthirsty King Herod's massacre, mockery of the villagers, being widowed, letting her Son leave the house for His public ministry, embracing the loneliness at her house in Nazareth, witnessing the tormenting death of her Son and burying Him, finally, waiting the rest of Her lifetime to see her Son in heaven after His ascension, while having no one around who could fully understand her sufferings. The list could go on.

At times, we think about how tough our life could get and that there isn't really anyone around us who would understand what we go through. Whether it be physical, mental, or spiritual sufferings we experience, it is important to constantly remind ourselves that there is someone who went through it all so we can always have her sitting right next to us to lend her shoulder for us to lean on. Her name is Mary. Being our Mother, she cries more than us when we cry. She is a kind and gentle Mother full of compassion, as she has gone through so many pains throughout her life. God likes to use broken hearts to heal other broken hearts since the best instruments of healing are the people who know how painful it is to live on with brokenness.

The simple words "Mom, I am tired. Could you come hold my hands?" are enough for her to fly near us and embrace us. We all have the greatest Mother we could ask for. Why not seek her help and consolation? She is waiting right next to us. All we need to do is turn our heads to her, for she will never leave our side. She is the one who saw Christ taking His first steps as a toddler. Christ too must have fallen countless times as a baby trying to walk for the first time, and Mary must have been joyful to see her Son grow and help Him get up. You and I are always going to be toddlers who will fall so many times on our journey to heaven. We need a mother who helps us and encourages us to keep walking.




The Call of the Catechist

God tends to invite or call us through other people. Think of the invitations that you have received in your lifetime—invitations that have made a difference and perhaps even changed your life. It's possible that an invitation led to a friendship, a new hobby, your present job, your significant other, or choosing to live in the part of the world you do. Thankfully, each year an incredible group of people respond to a call from Christ (and the Religious Education Department) with life-altering potential: to become catechists here at Our Lady of Sorrows.

At the heart of catechetics is an invitation. It's an invitation to the children of our parish to let Christ into their minds and hearts - and thus into their entire lives. Because invitations are powerful. They make the invitee feel special, affirmed, honored, wanted, accepted, noticed, part of a relationship, and part of something bigger than themselves. And, yes, personal invitations can change lives, because they can change the way we think and feel about ourselves and others. That means they serve as a critical tool in the process of conversion, which is the call to change how we think, feel, and act.

This year's Catechetical Sunday theme is all about invitation: *"Come to me all you who labor and are burdened."* (Matthew 11:28)



Jesus personally invites us to follow him, and he promises that he will not add to our burdens. Rather, he will lighten them. This invitation, which catechists extend to others, is life-changing.

Please keep our catechists in your prayers throughout the upcoming school year - but particularly this weekend as the Church marks Catechetical Sunday. May our catechists continue to hear the Lord's invitation to follow him more closely; may their burdens be lightened; and may they always make it a priority to invite others to follow Christ more closely through their evangelizing catechesis.
