

#### A Message From Fr. Brian

Oftentimes in the confessional, people confess the sin of jealousy. I'll usually use that as an opportunity to explain the difference between jealousy and envy. Many people use those terms interchangeably and while they're related, there's a definite difference between them. While modern usage doesn't always acknowledge this difference, people of faith should be aware of the different meanings of these words.

Envy is defined as a "painful or resentful awareness of an advantage enjoyed by another joined with a desire to possess the same advantage." In other words, I might look at the possessions or the career or the lifestyle of another person and it might lead me to becoming envious, even to the point that I become sad and resentful that I don't have what they have.

Jealousy, on the other hand, is our desire "to guard what one possesses (or wants to possess) and to keep others from having it." It's also defined as being "vigilant in guarding a possession." For example, some people become jealous of losing their spouses to the affections of another person or because their spouses give more time and attention to a certain activity than to their marital relationship and family life.

So, envy is wishing you had what someone else has, while jealousy is the fear of losing what you have. While envy is always considered wrong and sinful, jealousy can, depending on the situation, be a positive emotion. We of course would never speak of God as being envious. He does not need anything from anyone else, since He is complete and perfect in Himself. But God says of Himself, "I the Lord am a jealous God" (Exodus 20:5). God wants us to put Him first in our love and affections. He wants to preserve His relationship with us against any unhealthy rivals. Likewise, a jealous wife wants to guard against any possibility of unfaithfulness in her husband. Jealousy in a marriage can therefore be a good thing since spouses want to guard against the intrusion of others in their marriage. At the same time, jealousy can be taken too far and lead to the extreme of paranoia.

Envy, as already noted, is always wrong. St. Augustine described it as a diabolical sin and he based this on Scripture: "Through the devil's envy death entered the world, and those who belong to his party experience it" (Wisdom 2:24). We should never allow the blessings of others to sadden us or rise up resentment in us, but instead we should rejoice in the blessings of others and give thanks to God for the blessings that we ourselves enjoy. Think about it: each of us is probably more blessed, at least materially, than 99.999% of the people who have ever walked this planet. We should be therefore thankful for those blessings. That attitude of gratitude is the antidote to envy.

Why do I write about envy and jealousy? Because of what we hear from St. James in this Sunday's 2<sup>nd</sup> reading. He clearly warns us against both envy and jealousy. He writes, "Where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there is disorder and every foul practice." He is writing about an unhealthy jealousy, not the healthy type of jealousy described above. He also writes about the danger of envy. Instead, James encourages us to be led by Godly wisdom: "The wisdom from above is first of all pure, then peaceable, gentle, compliant, full of mercy and good fruits, without inconstancy or insincerity. And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace for those who cultivate peace."

Let's take to heart these words of St. James, leaving behind all envy and unholy jealousy, and let's show our gratitude to God for the many blessings that we already enjoy and allow His peace to be cultivated in our hearts.

On September 19th, the Church celebrates Catechetical Sunday under the theme "Say the Word and My Soul Shall Be Healed." Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each baptized person plays in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. As such, Catechetical Sunday is a chance for everyone to rededicate themselves to this mission as a community of faith. The word catechesis is from a Greek word meaning "to echo" and indeed all those who teach the Catholic faith and share the Church's teachings are catechists. All those who teach in the Church's name and about Jesus by the way they live are catechists. Parents and guardians are also catechists as they are the first and primary teachers of the faith for their children.

In May of 2021, Pope Francis established the lay ministry of catechist in the Catholic Church in his apostolic letter *Antiquum ministerium*. This document officially declared that catechists are to be recognized as lay ministers in the Catholic Church and are due the training and support they need to be successful in their ministry.

On Catechetical Sunday, we come together as both a parish and Church community to acknowledge the dedication of *all* those who serve as catechists in our parish family. We especially thank those individuals who have graciously volunteered their time and talents to bring the gospel to the children of our parish in a formal way as part of our CCD program. #### HERITAGE MASS

Director of Music/Organist Among the most important parts of the liturgical music that we sing at Mass is the musical setting of the Ordinary of the Mass: the Kyrie, the Gloria, the Holy, Holy, Holy, etc. I often alter the setting to coincide with a new liturgical season. For instance, during Advent we sing the Holy, Holy, Holy, the Memorial Acclamation, and the Great Amen to the tune of "O Come. O Come, Emmanuel." For the summer months, we sang a musical setting that was new for OLS, the Missa Simplex, which our congregation caught on to guite well. To help keep variety and interest in our Liturgical music, lest it become stale or without enthusiasm in support of the Eucharist, we will switch that setting up for these next several months to the Heritage Mass. While it has not been done often at OLS, it is widely known throughout the U.S. and should be familiar to anyone who has traveled or attended other parish churches in the Archdiocese or beyond. The goal is of course to enable the assembly to participate confidently and robustly in the musical settings of the Mass, whilst still providing variety to our musical choices. It is my hope that you all find this setting very singable and with straightforward melodies so that all may participate with confidence. If you would like to listen to it in advance. # Attention Parents of All Students Celebrating the Sacraments of First Reconciliation and First Eucharist This School Year


