September 24, 2023 Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

A Message from Fr. Brian

Most of us have been brought up to believe in the expression, "an honest day's pay for an honest day's work." And so, when we hear this Sunday's Gospel, the Parable of the Laborers in the Field, we immediately think, "That's just not right. That's not fair." It's so easy to identify with the grumbling guys in the Gospel who worked from sunup to sundown, in the heat of the day, and then watched in amazement as some slackers who worked for just one measly hour got paid a full day's wage.

The full-day workers expect to be paid more. And they should get paid more. The guys who worked all day have a good argument. But the parable isn't really about who should get paid what. The parable isn't even about the workers. The parable is about the owner. The parable is about God. He is the Divine Employer. The parable is about a God who offers His gift of grace to us, even when we don't deserve it.

You may have heard the story of John Newton. He was a sailor and eventually became the captain of his own ship – a slave trading ship. And he prospered, gaining great wealth by selling slaves. John didn't care whether God did or didn't approve of his business. Then on one of his trips to trade slaves, everything changed. John found religion. Or better yet, religion found John. As he attempted to steer the ship through a violent, deadly storm, he was convinced that all was lost. Just as he thought the ship was going to sink, he surprised himself by calling out, "Lord, have mercy on us." Just like that, the storm started to let up and the ship was saved from going down.

John reflected on this, and he became convinced that God had spoken to him through the storm. He changed his life and gave himself to God. He got out of the slave business. He immersed himself in the study of theology and he became an Anglican minister. He met a poet named William Cowper and the two of them began collaborating on new hymns. You know one of their hymns very well. The hymn that John Newton wrote is Amazing Grace: *Amazing grace! How sweet the sound. That saved a wretch like me! I once was lost, but now am found. Was blind, but now I see.*

How can we think that God would ever be unfair? After all, God saved the life of a slave trader. God brought conversion to a person who had ignored Him for years. Would any of us dare tell God that He was unjust? No, because we've all received grace from God, even if not in the dramatic way that John Newton did.

That's what the Parable of the Laborers in the Field is really about. God's grace comes to different people at different times and in different ways. Perhaps some of us may feel that we haven't been the person we could be and should be. Maybe we're right about that. But we haven't missed our opportunity. God's grace is amazing. And even if we think we're already close to God, there's still room to grow closer and that's what God's grace helps us to do.

Here's the challenge that Jesus is presenting to us: At some point this week, examine your life in a brutally honest way and ask yourself two questions: 1) What kind of person am I? And 2) What kind of person should I be? Each of us will discover that there is a gap between those two answers. And then we need to have a serious conversation with God and ask Him for His gift of grace so that we – God and us together – can start to close the gap. And so that we can begin to say: Amazing grace, how sweet the sound.
