We are still missing a few registrations. If you have not done so already, please be sure to register for CCD as soon as possible so that we can be sure to have enough catechists for all of our classes.


2024-2025 CCD Registration Form



Our Class Teaching Roster is Full!



SAINT / FEAST OF WEEK ONE The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Feast Day: August 22nd

The feast of the Queenship of Mary on August 22 is more than just another way of honoring Mary as the mother of Jesus; it is also a reminder that all of us are "kings and queens" in the Kingdom of God—even the youngest of your kids!

Once celebrated on the last day of May ("Mary's month"), it is now celebrated on the octave day of the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. (You'll remember that the Assumption is all about Mary being taken (assumed) into heaven body and soul as the first fruit of Christ's salvation of humanity.)

The feast of the Queenship of Mary was established in 1954 by Pope Pius XII, but the tradition pf celebrating Mary as queen of heaven goes back much earlier, with various saints and Church fathers referring to Mary as "lady" and "queen" as early as the fourth century. The basic idea is that if Jesus is "king," then it is fitting that Mary, his mother, would share in his reign as queen. This way of understanding the honor due Mary as the Mother of God became especially popular in the Middle Ages, with its emphasis on courtly manners, but it also has a biblical basis. The Book of Revelation describes a woman clothed with the sun and crowned with twelve stars, traditionally understood to be Mary. When the angel Gabriel appears to Mary, he says that her son, Jesus, will inherit the throne of David (Luke 1:32). Later, Mary proclaims her Magnificat (Luke 1:46-56), in which she says, "Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me...."


Although the feast day honors Mary, it is also a reminder of our own baptismal call to fully participate in the Reign of God—a call we received when we were baptized as priest, prophet, and king in Christ. Mary's "coronation" as "queen of heaven" points to the destiny that God wants for each of us: full participation in the glory of heaven.

SAINT / FEAST OF WEEK TWO

St. Monica

Feast Day: August 27th

Patron of: Married women and mothers (particularly mothers of wayward children)

If there were a poster child for the power of prayer, it would be St. Monica, whose feast day we celebrate on Aug. 27. Through her unceasing prayers and unfailing example of how to live a Christ-like life, St. Monica brought about the conversion of both her husband, Patricius, and her son, Augustine, one of the greatest Doctors of the Church.

Monica was born in 332 A.D. in Tagaste, North Africa. Her parents were Christians and she grew up in an atmosphere of devotion and Christian practice. However, her life became much harder when she was married to a man who was a pagan and made no secret of his dislike for Christianity. Patricius had a violent temper and often harassed Monica about her faith. He refused to allow her to have their three children baptized. She was able to teach them about Christianity and showed them how to live a Christian life, in direct contrast to her husband's behavior, which included unfaithfulness to his marriage vows.

Rather than nag her husband, though, Monica was an attentive and devoted wife, obeying Patricius in everything except in matters of faith, where God won out. Her meek behavior and her steadfastness in her faith began to have an effect on her husband. And in time, Patricius' temper cooled and he became more accepting of his wife's Christianity.

Monica prayed continuously for her husband's conversion, and finally, after 16 long years, Patricius was baptized in 370. One year later, he died, but Monica was content that she had done her job by making sure her husband was ready to go home to God.

But she still had her son, Augustine, to worry about. Her other two children, Navigus and Perpetua, had embraced Christianity, become baptized, and entered religious life. But Augustine had taken after his father and decided that a life of "wine, women and song" was more to his liking. Monica shed many tears over Augustine and pleaded with him to turn away from sin. But he ignored her tears, preferring his way to hers and even turning to heretical philosophies.

Monica didn't give up on him. She prayed even more than before. Finally, after 14 years, Augustine converted and turned to Christ. His mother was with him when he was baptized during the Easter celebration in the year 387 in Milan, Italy.

Having achieved her goal of bringing her son to God, Monica felt that her life's work was over. Returning home to Africa, she told Augustine, "Son, for mine own part I have no further delight in anything in this life. What I do here any longer, and to what end I am here, I know not, now that my hopes in this world are accomplished." Soon after, she died, and was buried in the port city of Ostia.



Prayer to St. Monica


St. Monica never stopped praying for her children - especially the wayward Augustine, who went on to be on of the greatest Doctors of the Church. In one of the most moving portions of Augustine's *Confessions*, he related how clearly Monica identified her life's mission as delivering her children into the life of faith.

Saint Monica is the patron saint of people in difficult marriages, difficult children, and the conversion of relatives, particularly one's own children. She is the consoling friend in heaven who wholly understands the despair of parents who feel helpless and confused as they watch their children drift away from the church. As Monica prayed and fasted for her children to come to know Christ Jesus, she is our powerful companion and intercessor to all who feel confounded by the "journeys" of their sons and daughters. Give this one a try if you children seem to be struggling with their faith:

Dear Saint Monica, you were once the mournful mother of a prodigal son. Your faithfulness to prayer brought you and your son so close to God that you are now with him in eternity. By your intercession and God's grace, your son St. Augustine became a great and venerable Saint of the Church. Please take my request to God with the same fervor and persistence with which you prayed for your own son. (Mention your intentions here.)

With your needs, worries and anxieties, you threw yourself on the mercy and providence of God. Through sorrow and pain, you constantly devoted yourself to God. Pray for me that I might join you in such a deep faith in God's goodness and mercy.

Above all, dear Saint Monica, pray for me that I may, like your son, turn from my sin and become a great saint for the glory of God. Amen.



In the Liturgy of the Word, the Church feeds the people of God from the table of his Word. Previewing the readings before Mass then is then a bit like looking over the menu before you get to a restaurant: you have a better idea of what you can expect so that you can enter into the experience more fully prepared. And like a good discussion during a meal, discussing the readings and how they can be applied to your family's daily life helps your family to truly go out and proclaim the gospel after leaving the church.


