

#### Make a Joyful Noise Unto the Lord!



# Tips from Parents, Teachers and Students for a New School Year

"The start of a new school year presents opportunities to strengthen spiritual and emotional well-being, setting the tone for a successful and balanced academic journey. However, the new school year is often stressful and anxious for many students and their families. Nine out of 10 parents of children under 18 experience stress during the back-to-school season. This is especially true for those with neurodivergent or diagnosed ADHD, dyslexia, or dyscalculia, according to a 2023 study by Understood.org, a nonprofit serving 70 million Americans with learning and thinking differences.

#### Think You Have Had a Busy September?


"Pope Francis began an 11-day tour of four island nations across Southeast Asia and Oceania last week, an ambitious trek to faraway corners of the Roman Catholic world.

His first stop was Indonesia, a country made up of thousands of islands with the largest Muslim population in the world, as well as millions of people following other religions. There, Pope Francis talked about interfaith dialogue and coexistence, praising Indonesia as nurturing harmony between its different ethnicities, languages and religions, which he compared to the country's rich ecological biodiversity.

On Friday night, he arrived in Papua New Guinea, where thousands stood along the road from the airport to welcome him. In the resource-rich but largely underdeveloped country, he urged government officials to promote sustainable and equitable development that benefits everyone. He also called for an end to the tribal violence that has plagued Papua New Guinea.

On Sunday, Francis flew to the remote town of Vanimo, on the country's Pacific coast, where he was welcomed by about 20,000 worshipers, some of whom had walked for days from rural villages to get a glimpse of him. Sitting on a stage, the pope wore traditional headgear he'd been presented with, an elaborate creation of fur and feathers. Then he stood to bless the huge crowd, as well as the rosaries and plastic bottles of water they had brought along.

On Monday, the pope landed in East Timor, a predominantly Catholic nation of 1.3 million, to cheers and fanfare from the faithful gathered to meet him. He commended the country's progress throughout the two decades since it emerged from a bloody battle for independence from Indonesian rule. The pope left for Singapore today, the last stop on his trip." (NY Times 09/11) Phew!


### The Exultation of the Holy Cross

Feast Day: September 14th

Early in the fourth century, Saint Helena, mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the holy places of Christ's life. She razed the second-century Temple of Aphrodite, which tradition held was built over the Savior's tomb, and her son built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on that spot. During the excavation, workers found three crosses. Legend has it that the one on which Jesus died was identified when its touch healed a dying woman.


The cross immediately became an object of veneration. At a Good Friday celebration in Jerusalem toward the end of the fourth century, according to an eyewitness, the wood was taken out of its silver container and placed on a table together with the inscription Pilate ordered placed above Jesus' head: Then "all the people pass through one by one; all of them bow down, touching the cross and the inscription, first with their foreheads, then with their eyes; and, after kissing the cross, they move on."

To this day, the Eastern Churches, Catholic and Orthodox alike, celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on the September anniversary of the basilica's dedication. The feast entered the Western calendar in the seventh century after Emperor Heraclius recovered the cross from the Persians, who had carried it off in 614, 15 years earlier. According to the story, the emperor intended to carry the cross back into Jerusalem himself, but was unable to move forward until he took off his imperial garb and became a barefoot pilgrim.



### Celebrating the Feast of the Exultation of the Cross with Kids



The first question your kids are likely to ask is, "What does exultation mean?" Let's face it, there simply aren't that many things that we say that we exalt these days. Basically to exalt something as a verb means to lift it high or speak highly of it to the degree of really dignifying and honoring it. This is something we, as Catholic do, with the Cross: the vehicle of our salvation. So, if you are looking for some craft and recipe ideas for helping to nurture your child's devotion to Christ and His Cross, be sure to visit the Catholic Icing website.



In the Liturgy of the Word, the Church feeds the people of God from the table of his Word. Previewing the readings before Mass then is then a bit like looking over the menu before you get to a restaurant: you have a better idea of what you can expect so that you can enter into the experience more fully prepared. And like a good discussion during a meal, discussing the readings and how they can be applied to your family's daily life helps your family to truly go out and proclaim the gospel after leaving the church.



#### **Catholic Trivia**

Answer: C Normally the Sunday feast takes precedence, but if it is the patron feast of the parish the pastor can opt to use the readings corresponding with the parish's feast. Thus, the Mass of Our Lady of Sorrows and not the "normal" Sunday Mass readings will be used. So, be sure to come to Mass and then celebrate Our Lady's feast at the parish picnic.
