Gospel Reflection Stickers for the Week

Many people are surprised when they walk into Mass on the First Sunday of Advent and find it to be a little bit more subdued than they were expecting. They are often doubly surprised to hear that the Gospel is once again about the end of days and Jesus' second coming. The Gospel points out that many people will be too distracted by things like eating, drinking and worrying to recognize the signs of the end of the world.

To highlight the idea of the dangers of distraction, our Opening Service started with a game of Family Feud asking the kids to identify the top eight causes of distracted driving. Spiritual distraction is just as dangerous! And much like highway hypnosis, we can often be so caught up in the day to day routines of life that we forget about God. Thankfully, Jesus offers us an antidote to distraction: prayer!

It's Almost Showtime!

You might be surprised to learn how many kids know the plot of *Frosty the Snowman* or *Elf* better than they know the actual story of Christmas. Participation in the church's annual pageant is a great way to help the HUGE idea of the incarnation stick in your child's brain. It's not too late to sign up. 
Last Week for our Christmas Goodie Bag Collection






Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception 2024

SAINT / FEAST OF THE WEEK St. Nicholas Feast Day: November 6th

Patron Saint of: Children, Unmarried People, Fishermen, Pawnbrokers, and the Falsely Accused

Attributes in Art: Bishop's clothes including miter and staff, white beard

Saint Nicholas was the bishop of Myra (modern-day Turkey) in the fourth century. Very little is known about his life as a bishop, but many miracles have been attributed to his intercession and many stories have been passed down about his deeds.

One thing is certain, Saint Nicholas is known for his generosity. After his parents died, Saint Nicholas gave away all his inheritance to the poor.

Then there was a man in Myra with three beautiful daughters. In the ancient world a father needed to give money to the men who married his daughters. This money was called a dowry. Without a dowry, the girls would have to become slaves to make ends meet. This man didn't have any money and he didn't think he would ever be able to help his daughters get married.

St. Nicholas heard about the family's troubles, but the man refused to receive any gifts from him. So, Saint Nicholas came to the man's house at night with a bag full of gold. Stockings were hung by the fire to dry throughout the night. Saint Nicholas threw the gold through the window and they miraculously landed inside the stockings. With this gold the daughters were finally able to get married.

This story is the reason many Christians today still set shoes out on Saint Nicholas Day and hang stockings on their fireplaces for Christmas.




St. Nicholas versus Santa Claus

In the Liturgy of the Word, the Church feeds the people of God from the table of his Word.
