\* You may be thinking, "Wait. What? Lesson 9? I thought we were much further along than Lesson 9!" And you would be right. Our in-person classes skipped Lesson 9 earlier in the year. Lesson 9 deals with the Sacraments of Healing. We postponed its study so that we could cover it on a day when the students in grades 2-8 are celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation.



# Reconciliation at CCD Grades 2 - 8

Monday, March 24th Tuesday, March 25th

The Church asks Catholics to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation during the penitential season of Lent. As a result, all our in-person students who have previously celebrated the Sacrament of Reconciliation will attend confession next week in **CCD**. The theme for the entire day will center around the Sacraments of Healing. You can help prepare your children for celebrating the sacrament by walking them through an Examination of Conscience in the days before CCD. (We'll do one on Monday and Tuesday instead of our usual Opening Service, but parents are great at helping to jog their kids' memories when it comes to misbehavior.) You might also want to review the Act of Contrition with them. It's a great prayer to add to your nighttime routine during Lent.

## **Empowering God's Children Reminder**

Attn: Parents in Grades K-7\*

## Please give the following your attention prior to April 1st. Thank you!

This year the Archdiocese of Newark is asking parents to partner with us to teach the two lessons below:

**Lesson 1 - Physical Boundaries: Safe and Unsafe Touching Rules:** Students learn simple rules about what to do and how to react when someone's touch is confusing, scary, or makes the child or young person feel uncomfortable. Young people start to deal with the real risks they face when they are out in the world and

on their own, and they begin to learn where to draw boundary lines in relationships.

**Lesson 2 - Safe Adults, Safe Touches and Special Safe Adults:** Children, young people, and their parents establish basic guidelines for working together to make certain which friends and other adults in their environment can be trusted to act safely and in the best interest of each child or young person.

# SAINT / FEAST OF THE WEEK

St. Joseph

Feast Day: March 19th

**Patron of:** Universal Church, a happy death, families, fathers, expectant mothers, explorers, pilgrims, travelers, immigrants, home sellers and buyers, craftsmen, engineers and working people

Attributes in Art: Often seen holding lilies

The Bible pays Joseph the highest compliment: he was a "just" man. The quality meant a lot more than faithfulness in paying debts.

When the Bible speaks of God "justifying" someone, it means that God, the all-holy or "righteous" one, so transforms a person that the individual shares somehow in God's own holiness, and hence it is really "right" for God to love him or her. In other words, God is not playing games, acting as if we were lovable when we are not.

By saying Joseph was "just," the Bible means that he was one who was completely open to all that God wanted to do for him. He became holy by opening himself totally to God.

The rest we can easily surmise. Think of the kind of love with which he wooed and won Mary, and the depth of the love they shared during their marriage.

It is no contradiction of Joseph's manly holiness that he decided to divorce Mary when she was found to be with child. The important words of the Bible are that he planned to do this "quietly" because he was "a righteous man, yet unwilling to expose her to shame" (Matthew 1:19).

The just man was simply, joyfully, wholeheartedly obedient to God—in marrying Mary, in naming Jesus, in shepherding the precious pair to Egypt, in bringing them to Nazareth, in the undetermined number of years of quiet faith and courage.


