CCD Registration for 2025-2026 Now Open

We encourage you to **register your child as early as possible**. Early registration helps to ensure that your child can be placed in a class on the day of your choice. Additionally, the volume of expected students impacts the number of volunteers we need to recruit and train as well as the types of spaces we are able to use and the number of workbooks we need to purchase. Your early registration is therefore greatly appreciated. (Plus, you'll save \$30!)

You are encouraged to register even if you do not know which day of the week your child will be able to attend - just let us know by September 1st!

Please **complete one registration form for each child** in grades K-8. Registration for the OLS high school Youth Group is separate and begins in September.

Basic 2025-2026 Details

There are **25 weeks of instruction** in the CCD year. The complete weekly calendar will be set by the parish at the end of June.

Classes are expected to begin Monday, September 29th and Tuesday, September 30th.

Traditional, in-person classes for Grades 1-8 will be offered on Monday and Tuesday afternoons.

- Kindergarten is only offered on Monday.
- Grade 7 is only offered on Tuesday.

You do not need to indicate your Monday or Tuesday day preference in order to register (though that would be very helpful) - just let us know by September 1st.

Monday and Tuesday classes will run from 3:55 - 5:15 pm. Our Opening Prayer Service and Gospel Reading will once again be held in the upper church. Catechists will then lead their students down to the OLS School for grade-based instruction. Dismissal will take place at 5:15pm from the OLS School.

Please note - the homeschooling program is not an independent study and parental involvement is critical to your child's full participation. Students in the homeschooling program use the same curriculum as their in-person counterparts. Participants are asked to meet with Mrs. Noll in May or June for an end-of-the-year discussion. The fee for the homeschooling program is the same as that of the in-person program.



Please Schedule Your End-of-the-Year Discussion

It's that time of the year once again! As per the directives established by the Archdiocese of Newark, children in parish homeschooling programs are asked to meet with a parish representative at the end of the year in order to maintain connection with the parish and to ensure that a thorough catechesis has taken place. If your child was a member of the OLS Homeschooling Program for the 2024-2025 school year (and not simply a few months due to a sports conflict), you should have received a SignUpGenius with information to schedule your year-end discussion with Mrs. Noll.

For those of you who might be new to the homeschooling program, please don't worry! This is not a test, but a faith-based discussion about some of the big topics of the year. Our new curriculum centers around the four pillars of the church, so that's how we'll focus our discussion:

- The Creed Who is God and how have you seen Him active in your life this past year?
- The Sacraments How are the ups and downs of our life reflected in the Church's liturgical calendar? How have you encountered Jesus in the sacraments?
- Moral Formation What are some of the tools we have to make good decisions and how have you used them in your daily life?
- Prayer What is your life of prayer like? How do you respond to God's invitation to be close to him?



Saint / Feast of the Week St. Paul VI, Pope

Feast Day: May 29th

Patron of: Archdiocese of Milan

Born near Brescia in northern Italy, Giovanni Battista Montini was the second of three sons. His father, Giorgio, was a lawyer, editor, and eventually a member of the Italian Chamber of Deputies. His mother, Giuditta, was very involved in Catholic Action.

After ordination in 1920, Giovanni did graduate studies in literature, philosophy, and canon law in Rome before he joined the Vatican Secretariat of State in 1924, where he worked for 30 years. He was also chaplain to the Federation of Italian Catholic University Students, where he met and became a very good friend of Aldo Moro, who eventually became prime minister. Moro was kidnapped by the Red Brigade in March 1978, and murdered two months later. A devastated Pope Paul VI presided at his funeral.

In 1954, Fr. Montini was named archbishop of Milan, where he sought to win disaffected workers back to the Catholic Church. He called himself the "archbishop of the workers" and visited factories regularly while overseeing the rebuilding of a local Church tremendously disrupted by World War II.


In 1958, Montini was the first of 23 cardinals named by Pope John XXIII, two months after the latter's election as pope. Cardinal Montini helped in preparing Vatican II and participated enthusiastically in its first sessions. When he was elected pope in June 1963, he immediately decided to continue that Council, which had another three sessions before its conclusion on December 8, 1965. The day before Vatican II concluded, Paul VI and Patriarch Athenagoras revoked the excommunications that their predecessors had made in 1054. The pope worked very hard to ensure that bishops would approve the Council's 16 documents by overwhelming majorities.

Paul VI had stunned the world by visiting the Holy Land in January 1964, and meeting Athenagoras, the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople in person. The pope made eight more international trips, including one in 1965, to visit New York City and speak on behalf of peace before the United Nations General Assembly. He also visited India (1964), Colombia (1968), Uganda (1969), and seven Asian countries during a 10-day tour in 1970.

Also in 1965, he instituted the World Synod of Bishops, and the next year decreed that bishops must offer their resignations on reaching age 75. In 1970, he decided that cardinals over 80 would no longer vote in papal conclaves or head the Holy See's major offices. He had increased the number of cardinals significantly, giving many countries their first cardinal. Eventually establishing diplomatic relations between the Holy See and 40 countries, he also instituted a permanent observer mission at the United Nations in 1964. Paul VI wrote seven encyclicals; his last one in 1968 on human life— Humanae Vitae—prohibited artificial birth control.

Pope Paul VI died at Castel Gandolfo on August 6, 1978, and was buried in St. Peter's Basilica. He was beatified on October 19, 2014, and canonized on October 14, 2018. Since 2019 his liturgical feast has been celebrated on May 29.

In the Liturgy of the Word, the Church feeds the people of God from the table of his Word. Previewing the readings before Mass is then a bit like looking over the menu before you get to a restaurant: you have a better idea of what you can expect so that you can enter into the experience more fully prepared. Resources for the Ascension of the Lord

The Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord commemorates Jesus' ascension into Heaven.

Historically, this holy day has been celebrated 40 days after Easter Sunday – the Thursday in the sixth week of Easter. Most U.S. dioceses, however, have moved the celebration of the Ascension to the seventh Sunday of Easter. For this reason, it is now often referred to as "Ascension Sunday." The day of celebration – Thursday or Sunday – seems to vary from diocese to diocese and country to country in 2025.

The Archdiocese of Newark is one of the dioceses in the country which celebrates this solemnity on Sunday, June 1st this year. Be sure to attend Mass with your child this Sunday so that he or she has a better understanding of this important piece of the paschal mystery. You can also click on one of the resource links below:


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
